For the second consecutive year, Standard and Poor's awarded an AAA bond rating to Avalon. We are the only seashore community in New Jersey with the AAA bond rating.

Avalon earned a "Class 5" rating, which translates into a 25% discount on flood insurance rates and in excess of \$1 million in savings on premiums paid by Avalon property owners.


Preparation Already Underway



Avalon received permission to build a road to the Graven's Island CDF, located in Middle Township, owned by the Borough. Avalon exhaustively tested the materials at Graven's Island so they could be offloaded by a contractor. Approximately 85% of the 150,000 cubic yards of material to be offloaded have been removed in advance of new dredge materials to be placed back on the island during the dredging project. Removal has been suspended until busy summer traffic subsides on Avalon Blvd.

Successful Borough Partnerships





Avalon has negotiated successful agreements with Middle Township and the New Jersey Department of Transportation to defray the overall costs associated with the dredging project.

\$740,000 Middle Township for dredging of Sterbeck Harbor (offsetting portion of sampling, permitting, design, and mobilization)

Up to \$2,000,000 State of New Jersey for dredging of Long Reach, Whale Harbor, Oler Thorofare, Graven's Thorofare, 54th Street Marina Entrance

Timeline for Dredging




Project out to bid: August, 2014
Contract award: September, 2014
Dredging to occur: October-December 31, 2014 and again
September-December, 2015

Note: No dredging is allowed in the State of New Jersey from January 1st-May 31st due to the state and federal winter flounder season

Avalon Beach Protection Initiatives



- -July 23rd meeting held on Shore Protection Alternatives Study
- -Successful back passing operation held, 50,000 cy of sand transferred to north end of Avalon
- -Avalon currently working on revisions to its Beach Management Plan to be submitted to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection


